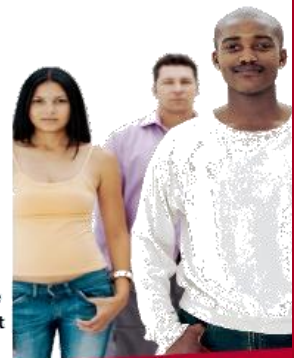

EMPLOYMENT QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

“ASK SUE”

Frequently I hear the same questions over and over. Maybe my answers will be of interest. I may not always have all the answers but I will try to give as complete an answer as possible. If I don't know the answer then I will do my best to find out what other professionals have to say. If you have a question that you wish to see answered in this space feel free to call your Labour Adjustment Committee representative and submit your question.

QUESTION: What does it take to do an effective job search in today's labour market?

ANSWER:

1. Newspaper Ads

Usually the older worker looks at this method of job search as the one they are most familiar with and will automatically start looking at these job ads first. Younger workers know they can find this information and classified job ads on-line at sites such as www.working.com, www.indeed.ca, and www.workopolis.com. In an area of high unemployment like the Windsor area most of the employers post their ads in the Saturday Classified Ads in the Windsor Star.

2. Job Search Websites

There are so many of these websites that anyone job searching might find their whole day is spent looking them up on the Internet, but doing this every day is a real waste of job search time. Some additional ones of value besides the ones mentioned above are: www.jobbank.gc.ca, www.jobs-emplois.gc.ca, www.gojobs.gov.on.ca, www.monster.ca

Don't be fooled into thinking that all one needs to do is look for these ads in the newspaper or on-line and your job search is done. When the economy is as seriously affected as it is right now and with so many people out there looking for work many employers find they do not need to advertise any of their labour needs.

3. Cold Calls

An energetic and assertive job searcher will make phone calls to companies that interest them, to find out if they are accepting resumes. This is what is meant by the term "Cold Call". Employer information can be found through the Yellow Pages or employer directories such as the Manufacturers Directory for Windsor & Essex County (found at all Windsor Libraries and most agencies involved in helping with job search). There are still a large number of employers who advise, they prefer to hire someone who took the time to find out what they do and determined that they have skills to offer the employer. This job searcher isn't waiting for a job to come to them. Don't waste your gas, call first to ensure they will accept your resume.

4. Temporary Employment Agencies

Many of the jobs that are listed on-line are posted by third party employers like the temporary employment agencies. A large number of employers locally have found the services offered to them by the temporary employment agencies helpful in keeping down their operational expenses. They also may not be prepared to commit themselves to hiring permanent workers when they aren't certain if they will receive further production contracts in an uncertain economy.

There are a number of reasons of why a temporary employment agency should be considered:

- This service enables the employer to observe a potential employee's work habits and skills prior to entering into a commitment to a formal hiring agreement. The employer can then decide whether to offer a good candidate a permanent position when their temporary contract with the agency has ended (usually varies between 3 and 6 months). Some placement agencies offer permanent placement opportunities as well as temporary placements. Prepare for the appointment with the agency as you would for any job interview.

- Employers are often more willing to take an inexperienced worker through a temporary work contract. This can represent an opportunity for an inexperienced person changing careers or a new course graduate to gain the experience needed to compete in their new career field. Find out about the agency's specializations, typical work assignments and the training that may be available to you.

- Anyone in receipt of regular Employment Insurance may be requested to attend an interview about their job search efforts; they will expect you to have considered the large percentage of job opportunities that are available through the temporary employment agencies. This may also be brought up when an EI claimant is asking to be considered for retraining.

5. Read Between the Lines

This is an old expression that is sure to date me, but what it is referring to is, do you watch for newspaper articles about new company expansions or openings that might offer a new job opportunity? Again, don't wait until they have to advertise openings. Call the main office or headquarters and find out if or when they expect to be accepting resumes. If you would really like to work there, you will make that call. Did you notice the picture in the paper recently of the people involved in ground breaking ceremony for the construction of a Green Shield building expansion? In the picture were two people from The Rosati Group Construction company. If you are looking for construction work, you should have been on the phone to this company. If you have medical knowledge and good computer skills then you should be finding out when Green Shield will start accepting resumes.

6. Networking

I'm sure most of you have heard the expression "It's who you know, not what you know". Keep in touch with former co-workers and let family, friends and other acquaintances know that you are available. They may know of someone hiring and be willing to provide an introduction or present your resume and a recommendation to their Human Resource Manager. If you had a recommendation from a former employer perhaps they are hiring again or know someone who is.

Using all of the above methods constitutes an effective and thorough job search. Some people feel they don't know enough people in business so they do volunteer work that keeps them active in the community and expands their network of contacts. Community service also looks very good on your resume and helps keep you from becoming housebound.
